#### 1. Call to Order; Introductions

Chair Gossett called the meeting to order at 1:30. Chair Gossett welcomed everyone and introductions were made.

#### 2. Revisions to Agenda

Chair Gossett asked if there were any revisions to the agenda; there were none.

#### 3. Approval of Minutes

Chair Gossett asked if there were any changes or additions to the minutes of the March 8<sup>th</sup> Board of Directors meeting; there were none. Mr. Dahlstedt moved approval of the March 8<sup>th</sup> minutes, seconded by Ms. Price-Johnson, all in favor, motion carried, #12-009.

### 4. Comments & Announcements from the Chair

Chair Gossett presented certificates and prizes to the winners of the Poster and Poetry Contest. Chair Gossett welcomed the winners of the Poster and Poetry contest. Chair Gossett noted that Marc Wynn, 1<sup>st</sup> place winner of the poster contest could not be here today, but he read a statement from Mr. Wynn.

Chair Gossett announced Scott Hohne was the first prize winner of the poetry contest and presented him with a certificate and his prize. Scott said a few words about his poem and his father read the poem for the group.

Second prize poster contest winner, Gretchen Peterson, was presented a certificate and her prize by Chair Gossett. Gretchen thanked everyone. Terry Ann Gallagher won second prize in the poetry contest, Chair Gossett presented her certificate and prize. Terry Ann thanked everyone and read her poem to the group.

Emily Wilcox, Executive category poster winner, was presented her certificate and prize by Chair Gossett. Emily said a few words about her poster. Richard Baillie, Executive category poetry winner, was presented a certificate and his prize by Chair Gossett. Richard read his poem to the group.

Chair Gossett thanked and congratulated the winners and announced that the first prize in each category will be printed.

#### 5. Reports from Board Members

#### 6. Comments from the Public

Dean Wight, Executive Director of Whatcom Counseling and Psychiatric Clinic addressed the Board regarding the Fund Balance distribution process. Dean said the issue is if the money is not obligated by June 30<sup>th</sup> the state could take the funds back. Dean said he wanted to note that the statement by NSMHA staff recommending that these funds not be used for services provided prior to now. Dean noted a reduction in inpatient claims contributed to the fund balance as the RSN predictions were high even, though we closed an Evaluation and Treatment center. Dean stated that this is in part due to outpatient providers working to reduce hospitalizations. Dean asked the Board not rule out allocations for services provided prior to this date as rates that were set by the RSN 5 years ago have not increased, despite the fact that costs have increased. Dean asked that the Board not rule out entirely the possibility of using some of the funds for retro-active payments, as about 60% of the fund balance is Medicaid funds, etc. As an alternative to giving the dollars back to the state, to please consider the possibility that the providers be recognized for their efforts in calendar year 2011 by allocating some of the funds for retro-active payments.

Kim Olander-Mayer and Chuck Davis provided a comprehensive PowerPoint presentation of the Ombuds Spring 2012 Report. Kim said if there is any information the Board would like to see included in this report to please let them know. Kim explained the report key for the group. Questions and answers took place throughout the presentation. A copy of the presentation is attached to the file copy as part of the official record. Chuck and Kim were thanked for their report.

#### 7. Report from the Advisory Board

Candy Trautman reported:

- The Advisory Board met on May 1<sup>st</sup> and the following items were discussed:
  - O Upcoming Conferences Tribal, Behavioral Healthcare and NAMI National.
  - o They welcomed the new NSMHA Executive Director, Joe Valentine.
  - O David Kincheloe gave a brief report regarding Integration of Healthcare in Whatcom County.
  - o Margaret reviewed Mental Health Block Grant (MHBG) Expenditures.
  - O The Advisory Board will hold a retreat July 10<sup>th</sup> at the Northwest Educational School District Building in Anacortes. A major topic will be recruiting membership.
  - o County vacancies were discussed.
  - O Jeannette Anderson resigned from the Advisory Board effective April 24th.

#### 8. Report from the Executive/Personnel Committee

Dave Gossett reported:

- The Executive/Personnel Committee met today and have a couple of items to address
- Fund Balance issue will be addressed under the Executive Directors report
- Chair of the Board is looking at some committee assignments and there may be action on that in the future

## 9. Report from the Quality Management Oversight Committee

Anne Deacon reported:

- QMOC met on April 25th
- Allen-Marr Settlement Review: The "Allen-Marr reviews" grew out of a settlement reached in a class-action lawsuit. The suit was brought on behalf of people held in state psychiatric hospitals who have developmental disabilities and who have not been able to return to their communities for lack of necessary services. In NSMHA's region there are 40 people who are members of this "class". The reviews are to ensure that there is real coordination of care between DDD, mental health and other services. One of the cases is reviewed each quarter to look at this. Tom Yost gave this annual report; and from this report will come recommendations for providers to address.
- Second Opinion Report: Kurt presented the report on the second opinions that were requested and completed in the third and fourth quarters of 2011. He noted that were 14 requests and all were scheduled and completed within the 30 day timeframe that is required in the WACs.
- Critical Incident Report: Kurt presented the report on critical incidents that were received in the third and fourth quarters of 2011; 22 incidents were reported. Critical incidents are reported by provider agencies when a consumer in the region is involved in something such as violent act or is a victim of abuse or neglect. Tracking these incidents allows the state and the region to look at any trends and to be aware of these types of things.
- CA/LOCUS Inter-rater Reliability Development Process: The Child & Adolescent Level of Care Utilization System (CALOCUS) and Level of Care Utilization System (LOCUS) are the tools we use in the region (adopted in 2007) to make consistent decisions in matching treatment resources to individuals' needs. Clinicians using these tools are tested annually and NSMHA will now have an online tool where they can test and be scored without supervisors having to oversee the process; saving provider's time and resources.
- LR (Less Restrictive Order)/CR's (Conditional Release) Inpatient/Outpatient provider procedures: Policy 1562 Monitoring of Less Restrictive Orders was discussed and reviewed as there were recent questions from providers regarding coordination with inpatient facilities and DMHP (Designated Mental Health Professional) offices for persons placed on less restrictive orders. NSMHA has requested that providers let them know of any cases where they have had issues around the coordination between inpatient facilities and the providers.
- Policy 1723.00 Outreach and Involuntary Investigations for Residents of Licensed Care Facilities: This is a new policy for coordinating with licensed care facilities when they have requested an investigation to prevent risk of discharge from the facility or hospitalization of the consumer. It also addresses the resident being able to discharge back to their facility. This policy was approved by QMOC to go forward.

Anne was thanked for her report.

#### 10. Report from the Planning Committee

Regina Delahunt reported:

- The Planning Committee met on April 30<sup>th</sup>
- Fund Balance Proposals:
  - O Discussion on the fund balance proposal summary centered on deciding if this was the best approach to determining allocation and the categories and priorities were discussed as well. There is \$4.4 million in Medicaid and \$3.1 million in State only funds to allocate; the State only funds are much more flexible.
  - O The committee would like one time, pilot and ongoing funding columns to be considered and when weighing proposals look at those that have more than one outcome and make sure that there is funding in several categories. The Planning Committee also wants to look at what the counties can bring to the table to leverage funding; particularly in the housing piece. The nine priorities work for the group; though it should be in a document that is more of a general recommendation of the programs or services; then later the allocations can be refined to specific programs or providers.

Regina was thanked for her report.

## 11. Report from the Executive Director

Joe Valentine reported:

- He is excited to be in this position and appreciated the opportunity the Board gave him to do this. Joes said this is an exciting time and both the risks and opportunities are pretty high right now.
- Acknowledged Greg for the leadership he provided during the transition, he did not miss a beat. There is a lot going on and Greg made sure that things continued to move forward and Joe noted that he really appreciates that.
- Acknowledged the staff, said they have been wonderful in briefing him and getting him up to speed, making sure things kept moving forward. Joe said he has met one-on-one with almost all staff members and is very appreciative of their depth of knowledge and backgrounds. There is a lot of knowledge here.
- Stakeholder meetings: Doing meet and greet meetings with board members, county coordinators, human service directors, provider CEO's and other stakeholders; has a very ambitious schedule for accomplishing this.
- Is soliciting advice and feedback on how do we position NSMHA to be a player in healthcare reform, as there are 3 different things going on simultaneously right now;
  - The state contracting with 5 managed care organizations as of July 1<sup>st</sup> and the state has required MOU's between health plans and RSN's. Greg and Joe have been actively participating in the state discussions on what should be included in the MOU's. Joe noted that he recommended at the state RSN meeting that we work collectively on a common template. As our staff dig into what this agreement would look like it is raising more and more questions about how will we make sure that people do not fall through the cracks as they move between the RSN system and managed care plans.
  - O The state is encouraging counties to agree to have the Dual Eligibles in their counties be enrolled in capitated managed care plans. Those are people that receive both Medicare and Medicaid, and are also the population that have the greatest needs and greatest costs.
  - O NSMHA identified its interest in pursuing the idea of establishing a regional healthcare alliance that would give the five counties leverage in dealing with the five health plans as we move towards managed care. Joe will be soliciting ideas about that. Discussed at Executive Committee what we hope to accomplish with that. Joe will work with the County Coordinators and hopes to bring ideas back in the next month or so with a recommendation. We are going to have to figure out how to do this while everything is changing around us.

• How to obligate \$7.5 million dollars of fund balance reserves. Directed the group to Tab 2 of the meeting packet and reviewed it with the Board. He noted that this has been vetted with the Planning Committee, Advisory Board, County Coordinators and staff. The bottom line is that by the end of June we have to have a Board motion that obligates this money. NSMHA received over 19 million dollars in proposals for 7.5 million dollars of funding. Staff is proposing that we will come back to the Board in June with a recommendation to allocate a certain amount of money for some or all of these categories.

Following that, a simple RFP process for one time funding, with conditions included. Proposals will have to clearly identify how money will be used on a one-time basis and how the proposal will be supported after the one-time funding. Another condition would be how the proposal supports evidence based practices. Some funding will be set aside to fund Supported Employment as the state will discontinue funding this July 1<sup>st</sup>. A little money will be set aside for Dignity and Respect training. One of the priority areas that we all agree on is housing services. County Coordinators agreed that it doesn't make sense to chop the money up into pieces, but rather look at it from a regional perspective and see what other funding sources we can leverage.

NSMHA acknowledges the rates need to be addressed and staff is doing an analysis of this. NSMHA will address this as a part of future development processes. Joe said he discussed this in Executive Committee and one of the critical areas of emphasis that was raised was the Triage Centers. We need to keep in mind that we need to maintain that system. Joe asked the Board if they had any comment on this. Helen Price Johnson had a question regarding retro-active payments, stating that Joe made a clear case about going forward, but didn't address for her why not look back? Joe said if we increase retroactively, then we need to know that we have the money going forward and we do not know that we will have it in order to sustain the increase. It would be better to increase base rates. He said that it is a real iffy time with not knowing our Medicaid rates and how much of our Medicaid funding will go to the Managed Care Plans. Joe noted that the state budgeting process is volatile in that they threaten cuts in the fall and then restore the cuts later.

 Noted that NSMHA has a vacant Quality Specialist position that is approved and funded in our budget for 2012 and NSMHA is going to move forward and fill that position.

Joe was thanked for his report.

#### 12. Report from the Finance Officer

Bill Whitlock reported:

- This is for the April 10, 2012 Financial Report. The Federal Block Grant and DDD (Division of Developmental Disabilities) are low. They have negative variances of \$53,586 and \$59,843 respectively. The state funds have a negative variance of \$27,397 and might be a timing variance, we cannot tell at this time. We received more Medicaid revenue than projected in 2012. This may increase our fund balance issue.
- On the expense side, we have a negative variance of \$469 in the Operating Rentals and Lease and a \$1,577 variance in the Repair and Maintenance budget. At this point, we anticipate these to be timing issues. The inpatient payment budget has a negative variance of \$270,818. We cannot tell at this point if this is a timing or permanent negative variance.
- The State Budget has been passed. The legislators eliminated the B-3 services payment in the Medicaid contract. That represents \$249,090 annually to this Region, or a \$124,545 cut this year starting July 1, 2012.
- We are asking the Board to transfer funds in the 2011 budget. Please transfer \$26,500 out of Professional Services and \$5,000 in Salaries and Wages, \$21,500 into Personnel Benefits in the NSMHA Operating Budget. We would also ask the Board to transfer \$2,800,000 out of Agency/County/Other Services and transfer \$2,800,000 into Inpatient Services payments. This information was sent out in the Board packet.

Bill asked if there were any questions. Mark McDonald asked if any other services that were funded by B-3 were being cut, and Bill said no. Bill was thanked for his report.

## **NSHMA Fund Balance Motion**

Move to encumber \$7,500,000 for special projects (\$3,126,265 in state funds and \$4,373,735 in Medicaid funds) as outlined by the priority categories below. NSMHA staff will commence with a procurement process as prescribed by the agency purchasing policies as soon as possible using one of the methods shown in the table below. For funds that will be distributed through an RFP process, a committee will review and rank the proposals received. The actual allocation of funds to proposals received for each of the categories may have to change depending on the mix of state and Medicaid funds that would be allowed/needed to fund the proposals. These recommendations will be brought to the Board of Directors for approval and contracting.

#### SIGNIFICANT POINTS OR EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Every year NSMHA surveys the current MHBG providers to determine whether the funding they have been allocated will be expended by the end of the contract period, which is 9/30/12. MHBG funds are not carried over between fiscal years.

This year Island & San Juan County returned \$57,078 in funding due to start up delays on their projects. A request was sent out to current providers to

The criteria used to determine where to allocate the funding was based on the following:

- 1. Onetime expenses;
- 2. Goods/materials;
- 3. History of exhausting previous MHBG funding.

The Advisory Board, who is required by state contract to be involved in the approval of the MHBG plan for the region, reviewed the proposed allocations recommended by NSMHA staff and is recommending approval to the Board of Directors.

### **CONCLUSIONS/RECOMMENDATIONS:**

The Board of Directors approves the motions for the MHBG allocations recommended by NSMHA & the Advisory Board to expend the excess MHBG funding.
