HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The Budget to Actuals Looks pretty good. Our state funds are still showing a large positive variance. Inpatient Treatment is still over budget, ITA Judicial is over budget, Mental Health crisis stabilization is currently showing a large variance, and Withdrawal Management is continuing to increase, also of note E&T services are increasing lately as is Mental Health Outpatient Services. HARPS and DOC housing is showing a large variance, I believe this is due to underestimating the expense and revenue when I built the budget, it may require a budget amendment later in the year, since this is an expense reimbursement program there won't be any financial impact. Most of the large positive expense variances are due to programs not running yet. Other SUD services has a large positive variance due mainly to the Recovery Navigator programs getting a late start.
- 2. The Revenue and Expense statement is still showing a large income which is mainly due to the payment of the November amendment amounts in January and additional annual Proviso payments received in July.
- 3. The one thing to note is the Medicaid fund balance, it has all been drawn down and the negative fund balance of \$1,085,659.00 had to be covered with State General Fund dollars, which we had enough of to cover but it has decreased our reserve to a very low level. The good news is that we have had meetings with all five MCOs and they have all agreed to increase their PMPM payments. We just today received a retro rate adjustment payment which will recover about half of the negative MCO fund balance, so hopefully as the other MCOs make retro payments to us we will recover most of the negative amount.
- 4. We have included a January to December projection of our revenues and expenditures to try and forecast possible areas of concern. There are some large projected variances including Inpatient, ITA Judicial, and Harps and DOC. Withdrawal Management and Crisis Stabilization are continuing to run higher than budgeted. The bottom line shows us as still running \$992,271 under budget for the year.

NOTES

1. We are presenting the financial statements for October 2022 for the Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization (ASO).

2. These monthly statements are prepared for the Board's use only. They provide a snapshot of expenses and revenue for a single calendar month compared with a hypothetical "year to date" projection. However, neither revenues nor expenditures occur on an equal 1/12 amount each month.

3. The North Sound BH-ASO adopts "calendar year" budgets, but the allocations from the state are done on a state fiscal year basis [with adjustments every 6 months]. The exceptions are Federal Block Grant Funds which are allocated for the entire fiscal year.

4. Revenues and expenses are managed independently within each of the major fund categories: Medicaid, State General Fund, Mental Health Block Grant, Substance Abuse Block Grant, and SAMHSA [a direct grant we receive from the federal government for our rural Medication Assistance Treatment program].

5. Within 'State General Funds', allocations are further subdivided between general state funds, and the multiple "Proviso" funds allocated for specific services.

6. We have added two new lines at the bottom of the "Revenue and Expense" tab which shows the beginning and ending fund balance within each fund category for the state fiscal year. I also added some additional lines at the bottom to show the Net Income from Operations before the transfer of funds to the BHO.

7. The Budget to Actuals statement includes notes on areas where there is a variance between the hypothetical year to date budget and actual revenues and expenditures. I also added additional lines at the bottom to show the transfer of funds separate from the normal operations.

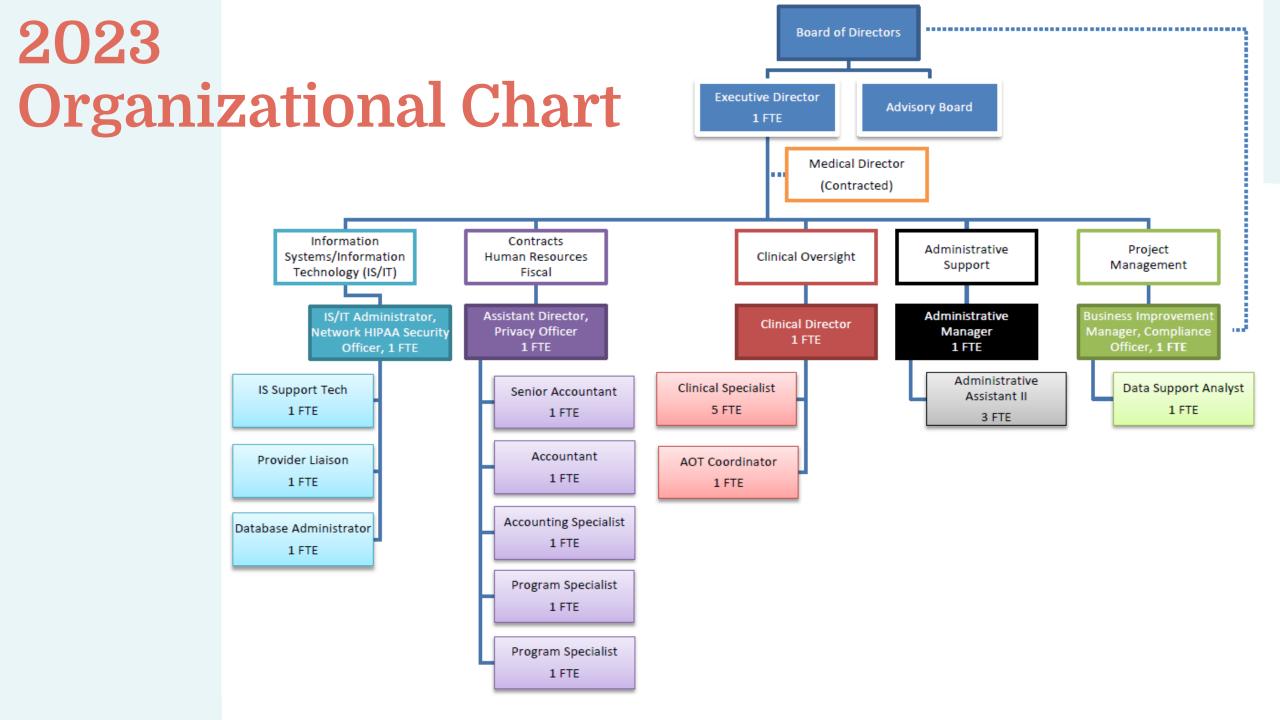

1. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES COORDINATING COUNCIL -DISCUSSION ON NETWORK ADEQUACY

- The Behavioral Health Services Coordinating Council [BHSCC] workgroup on "network adequacy" met again on October 31 to continue discussing how HCA should measure access to care.
- Commissioner Jill Johnson advocated for the creation of additional standards to be added to the MCO contracts to measure whether they are providing adequate access to care with their networks.
- There was discussion on the various factors creating barriers to timely access to care.
- HCA staff will create a grid detailing the various state efforts underway to better measure and monitor access to care, including the work on several legislative provisos such as the "rural behavioral health timely access study".

2. RECOVERY NAVIGATOR PROGRAM

- Staff have been hired and services are now being provided in all 5 counties.
- Attached are some of the success stories collected so far. [Attachment 1]

3. EXTENSION OF COVID RELIEF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANT FUNDS EXPENDITURE PERIOD

- CMS has agreed to extend the period the state can use the COVID relief Mental Health Block Grant funds through September 2023.
- HCA anticipates that a similar extension will be approved for SABG as well. This will give us more time to fully draw down all these funds.

4. CRISIS SERVICES UPDATE

- The Weekly Crisis Capacity Indicator snapshot through October 29 is attached [Attachment 2].
- The number of crisis calls and outreach services continue to be at the average level for the year though trended up a little during the month of October.
- Also attached is the monthly Dashboard [Attachment 3].

5. UPDATE ON BALANCED BILLING ACT - HB 1688

- North Sound staff are one of three ASOs participating in the state workgroup developing recommendations on how the provision in 1688 that commercial health plans reimburse providers of behavioral health crisis services would be implemented.
- There were two models being considered. In one model, the ASOs would be the intermediary in billing and collecting the reimbursements from commercial carriers.

- The other alternative would be for the providers to have direct contracts with the commercial carriers for purposes of billing and reimbursement.
- The workgroup voted to recommend the first alternative: using the ASOs as the intermediary so that the providers don't have the additional burden of collecting private insurance information during a crisis service and then billing multiple carriers.
- There are numerous technical challenges that have yet to be resolved including the additional administrative capacity ASOs would need to perform the intermediary function. The workgroup also recommended that that the full plan not go into effect until 2024 to allow time to work through all the technical issues.

6. NEW NORTH SOUND BH-ASO POSITION OPENINGS POSTED

- We have posted the position openings for the two new BH-ASO positions approved by the Board of Directors: Accountant and AOT Coordinator.
- Interviews of the top candidates are now taking place.

7. END OF STATE COVID EMERGENCY ORDER

- The Governor's COVID Emergency Declaration ended October 31. Our Attorney has researched our options for continuing to use a "hybrid" model for Board of Director meetings under the Open Public Meetings Act.
- He is sharing his analysis at the November 10 Governance and Operations Committee.

Recovery Navigator Program Success Stories – October 2022

Success Story #1

An individual who has been involved regularly with law enforcement over a long period of Participant around substance use was incarcerated again. Through our collaboration with the co-responder at the jail, RNP case managers met with the Participant, and they agreed to enroll in treatment. A facility was found, and preparations were made for a bus ticket to the treatment facility the following day. The Participant was picked up and transported to the bus depot, but the bus was cancelled. The facility was located approximately six hours away and not able to facilitate intake for another week. RNP staff helped the Participant develop a safety plan and checked in on the them daily, providing support, essential toiletries and food items. The Participant was able to utilize local supports and staff to remain substance free for the week and was transported back to the bus depot. The Participant arrived at the treatment center, followed up with RNP personnel during their stay and was able to secure housing at a recovery house upon successful completion of treatment. This individual has a high prognosis for a successful future while the prospects for future involvement with law enforcement, including incarceration have been significantly decreased!

Success Story #2

An individual who had been chronically homeless had frequent involvement with law enforcement around substance use. This person utilized the syringe services program regularly but was not interested in treatment or assistance with housing. After suffering some medical complications, and with the trust that had been built over Participant with other county outreach personnel, treatment options were explored. RNP personnel assisted in finding a facility and facilitating an over-the-phone intake, then provided transportation to the treatment facility, where the Participant is actively engaged in treatment and is getting the medical attention they need.

Success Story #3

Participant has been in the Recovery Navigator program since March of 2022. He came to the Recovery Navigator with a unique set of circumstances and challenges that he needed help addressing. Participant is on Social Security for a disability that he recently acquired, while unhoused, due to a very bad bicycle accident. After he became disabled, he was awarded a HEN (Housing and Essential Needs) voucher, which pays for the room he rents. This HEN voucher provided him housing for the first time in many years. When Participant first came to the Recovery Navigator, he was concerned as his landlord told him he would have to pay \$750 rent, as there was no HEN voucher for the month. Participant was confused and scared, afraid he was going to have to return to homelessness. The Recovery Navigator made several phone calls and helped Participant get his HEN voucher extended for one year. Had no one called to ask for this extension, Participant would have likely been exited from his programs and back into homelessness, unaware of the services available to him. Right away, Participant and his Recovery Navigator started applying for waitlists and longer-term voucher programs. Participant and the Recovery Navigator have been steadily working on finding a permanent, sustainable housing solution. In addition, Participant has needed assistance with transportation costs, as he has to ride the bus frequently due to his disability. The Recovery Navigator helped Participant apply for a reduced fare bus pass, saving a significant amount of money. Participant also had been struggling with poor vision and the Recovery Navigator helped him find an optometrist that accepts state insurance. Participant had a much needed

exam and discovered that he has severe cataracts in both eyes and will need surgery. Participant and the Recovery Navigator are now working on scheduling those appointments and surgeries. The process was daunting to Participant on his own but together they have been able to work through many challenges. This is a success story because had Participant not reached out to the Recovery Navigator Program for help, he would likely have fallen through the cracks in our systems and back out into homelessness. Because he had someone to turn to, to help advocate for his best outcome, he did not have to return to many of survival behaviors that often found him interacting negatively with law enforcement.

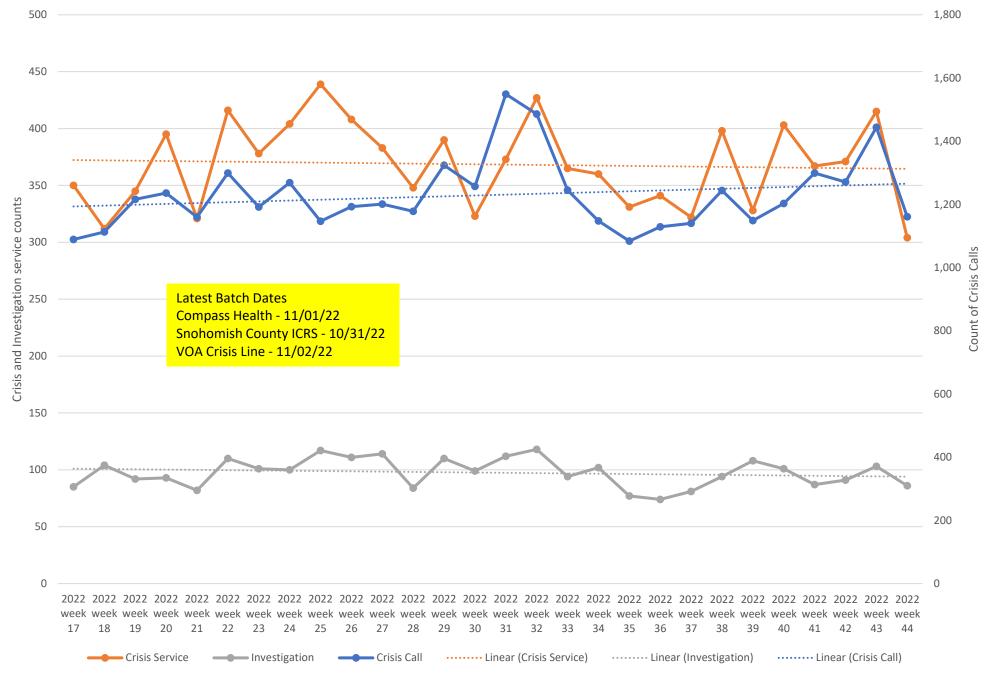
Success Story #4

Case managers have been working intensively with Participant. Participant was connected with APS on 8/3/22, to receive a new walker, CM assisted with the phone calls and supporting participant with following through on meeting APS case manager to obtain the walker. Participant needed medical attention in our parking lot on 9/1/22, CM called for an ambulance and followed up with hospital staff about participant's health. On 9/6/22 CL was removed from his encampment by law enforcement, RNP CM was able to store participant's belonging until 9/13/22 when Outreach team met up with him on the streets. Participant was asking for a bus pass and assistance on scheduling medical appointments. CM called APS CM and left a message about completing an intake for services. Participant was seen on 9/15/22 by Outreach and Residency Doctor, he was concerned about stomach pains that were causing diarrhea and was referred to come into a clinic. Participant did not want to be transported to urgent care. On 9/22 Outreach and RNP found Participant behind a local restaurant. Participant asked for an ambulance be called because he was feeling worse. Staff stayed with Participant until ambulance transported him to Hospital, staff held onto Participant's belongings until he was released the following day. Participant came to the office the next morning asking for help with getting his medical identification cards and a state identification card. CM transported Participant to DSHS and was able to get him a voucher for an ID card, a new EBT card, five-day bus pass, and was able to apply for Medicaid because Participant already has Medicare. CM also contact Social Worker and asked about assistance for Participant to be transferred to an out of county SUD facility and Social Worker stated she could assist with this. Participant is wanting to work on his health before entering a SUD's program and will meet with staff next week to schedule appointments.

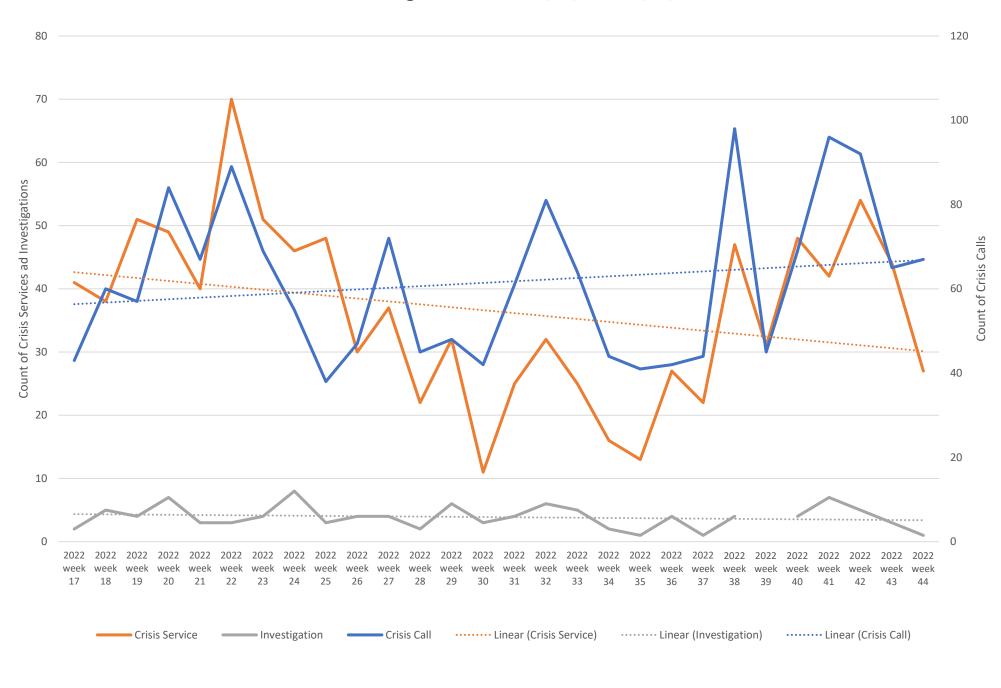


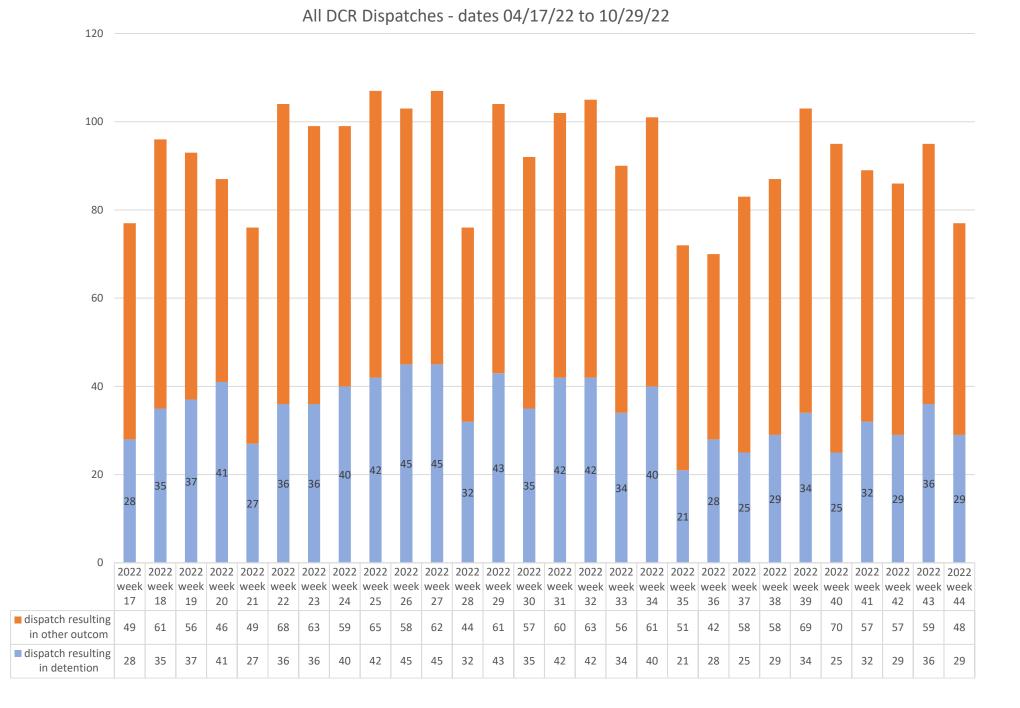

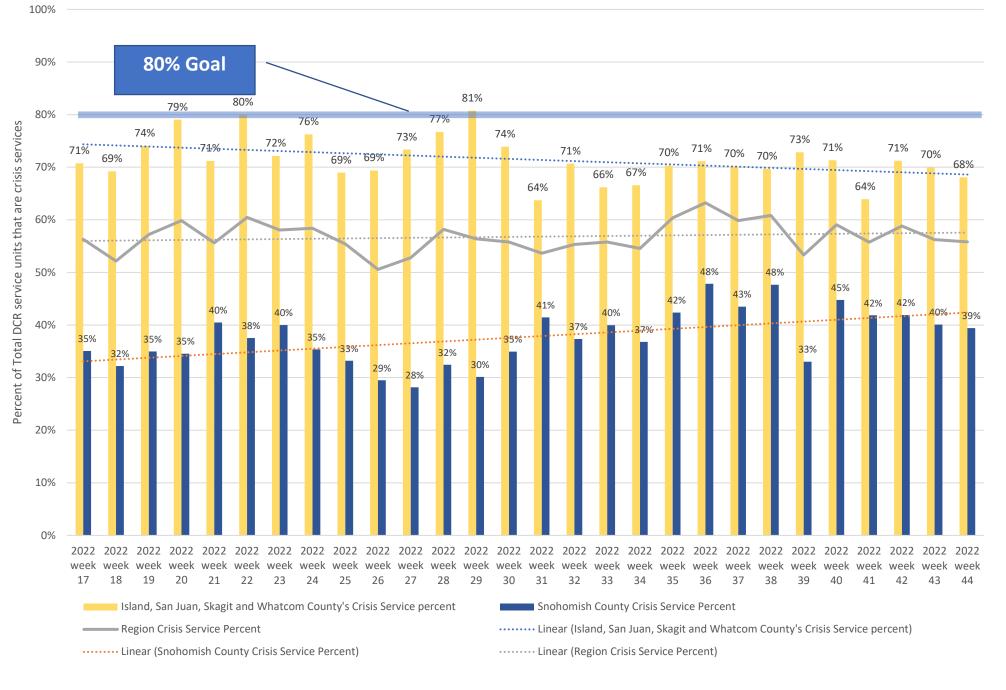

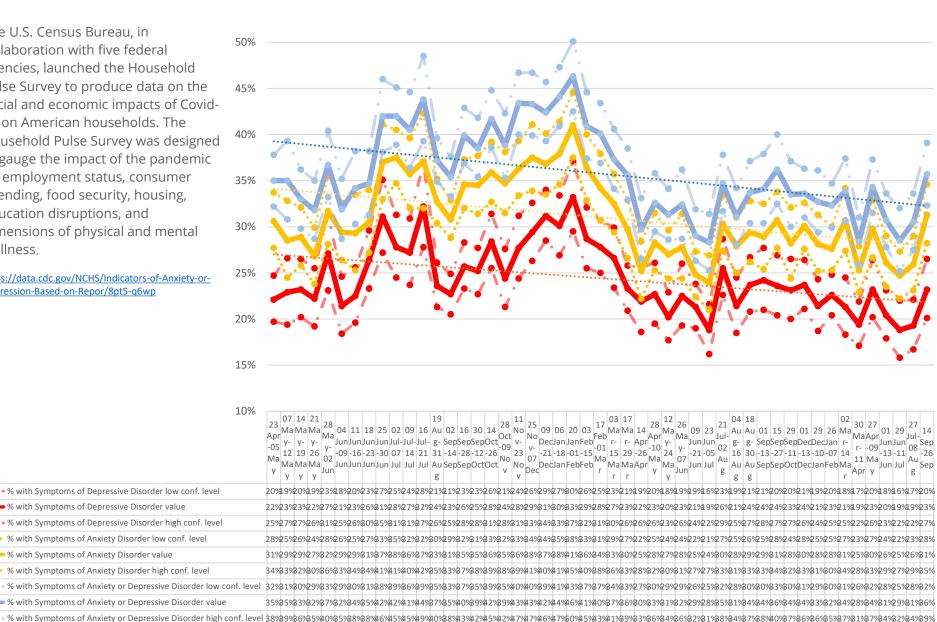

DISCHARGE PLANNER TOOLKIT

MOBILE RESPONSE AND STABLILIZATION SERVICES (MRSS) FOR CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILIES

North Sound BH-ASO is excited to announce that Compass Health was awarded the contract for new Child, Youth and Family Crisis Teams (CYFCT) in Whatcom, Skagit, and Snohomish Counties. MMRS is a child and family specific crisis intervention model that recognizes the developmental needs of children, young adults, parents, and care givers. CYFCT will provide initial crisis response and ongoing stabilization support that offers the community an upstream intervention that recognizes the family's sense of urgency and focuses on shifting pathways from higher intensity services. Compass Health's CYFCT will be a significant enhancement to our existing care crisis continuum. More information will be provided as the program is developed and implemented over the coming year.

BH-ASOs ADOPT 2023 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITES

The state association of Behavioral Health Administrative Service Organizations [BH-ASOs] have adopted the following legislative priorities for the 2023 Legislative Session:

- 1. Ensure adequate and sustainable funding for the expanded crisis system, including the 988-line, Regional Crisis Lines, and Mobile Crisis Outreach Teams.
- 2. Increase state requirements for and monitoring of Managed Care Organizations' "network adequacy" for behavioral health services.
- 3. Provide sustainable provider rates for both Medicaid and non-Medicaid services.
- 4. Provide adequate and targeted funding to reimburse Superior Courts for all the costs associated with Involuntary Treatment Act hearings.

RECOVERY NAVIGATOR PROGRAM (RNP)

RNP has been implemented in the North Sound Region. The program is designed to function as a diversion option for law enforcement in lieu of arrest for minor crimes, in addition to providing community-based outreach to youth and adults with substance use disorder (SUD), including persons with co-occurring substance use disorders and mental health conditions. The primary function of RNP is connection and stabilization with respect to a variety of social determinants/vulnerability factors. Individuals referred to the program will benefit from care coordination and connections to a broad range of community resources including SUD/MH treatment and recovery support services. There are two types of referrals into RNP: point of contact referrals by law enforcement and social contact referrals by law enforcement, service providers, community members, and friends/family.
