Recommendation from North Sound Prosecuting Attorneys regarding Distribution of Opioid Settlement Funds- North Sound Prosecuting Attorneys (Jason Cummings)

Jason Cummings, a Snohomish County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney, in conjunction with the other North Sound County Prosecuting Attorneys, presented a proposed plan for management of the Opioid Settlement Funds to be presented to the five North Sound counties.

Their recommendation included a role for the North Sound BH-ASO to provide administrative support by including a hyper-link on the BH-ASO's website which would route viewers to the respective county and city websites regarding the usage of the opioid funds from the settlement. It was also proposed that the North Sound BH-ASO would provide administrative support to the region's Opioid Abatement Council (OAC). This might include utilizing the BH-ASO's conference room and/or Zoom platform to for the OAC to use for their meetings, and to take minutes during the meetings and keep them on record for distribution as needed.

The Prosecuting Attorneys will present draft wording for an Interlocal agreement to be signed by all five counties to support this plan at the next Board of Directors meeting.

It was also noted that the BH-ASO could invoice the counties monthly to cover their administrative costs.

The elected official board members from all five counties were in favor of the recommendation regarding the BH-ASO's role, although no formal vote was taken

North Sound Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization December 8th, 2022, Board of Directors Financial Notes

HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The Budget to Actuals Looks pretty good. Our state funds are still showing a large positive variance. Inpatient Treatment is still over budget, ITA Judicial is over budget, Mental Health crisis stabilization is currently showing a large variance, and Withdrawal Management is continuing to increase, also of note E&T services are increasing lately as is Mental Health Outpatient Services. HARPS and DOC housing is showing a large variance, I believe this is due to underestimating the expense and revenue when I built the budget, it may require a budget amendment later in the year, since this is an expense reimbursement program there won't be any financial impact. Most of the large positive expense variances are due to programs not running yet. Other SUD services has a large positive variance due mainly to the Recovery Navigator programs getting a late start.
- 2. The Revenue and Expense statement is still showing a large income which is mainly due to the payment of the November amendment amounts in January and additional annual Proviso payments received in July. I finished the 9/30/22 R&E report for the State, that analysis shows that most of our State fund balance is tied to Proviso dollars, our available fund balance increased from \$3,458,081.11 to \$4,863,981.65 mostly due to using more block grant and moving some Proviso dollars over that we earned through deliverables. Our Minimum Reserve requirement is \$3,090,242.00.
- 3. The one thing to note is the Medicaid fund balance, it has all been drawn down and the negative fund balance of \$930,537.00 had to be covered with State General Fund dollars, which we had enough of to cover but it has decreased our reserve to a low level. The good news is that we have had meetings with all five MCOs and they have all agreed to increase their PMPM payments. We have received a retro rate adjustment payment which will recover about half of the negative MCO fund balance, so hopefully as the other MCOs make retro payments to us we will recover most of the negative amount.
- 4. We have included a January to December projection of our revenues and expenditures to try and forecast possible areas of concern. There are some large projected variances including Inpatient, ITA Judicial, and Harps and DOC. Withdrawal Management and Crisis Stabilization are continuing to run higher than budgeted. The bottom line shows us as still running \$992,271 under budget for the year.

NOTES

1. We are presenting the financial statements for November 2022 for the Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization (ASO).

2. These monthly statements are prepared for the Board's use only. They provide a snapshot of expenses and revenue for a single calendar month compared with a hypothetical "year to date" projection. However, neither revenues nor expenditures occur on an equal 1/12 amount each month.

3. The North Sound BH-ASO adopts "calendar year" budgets, but the allocations from the state are done on a state fiscal year basis [with adjustments every 6 months]. The exceptions are Federal Block Grant Funds which are allocated for the entire fiscal year.

4. Revenues and expenses are managed independently within each of the major fund categories: Medicaid, State General Fund, Mental Health Block Grant, Substance Abuse Block Grant, and SAMHSA [a direct grant we receive from the federal government for our rural Medication Assistance Treatment program].

5. Within 'State General Funds', allocations are further subdivided between general state funds, and the multiple "Proviso" funds allocated for specific services.

6. We have added two new lines at the bottom of the "Revenue and Expense" tab which shows the beginning and ending fund balance within each fund category for the state fiscal year. I also added some additional lines at the bottom to show the Net Income from Operations before the transfer of funds to the BHO.

7. The Budget to Actuals statement includes notes on areas where there is a variance between the hypothetical year to date budget and actual revenues and expenditures. I also added additional lines at the bottom to show the transfer of funds separate from the normal operations.

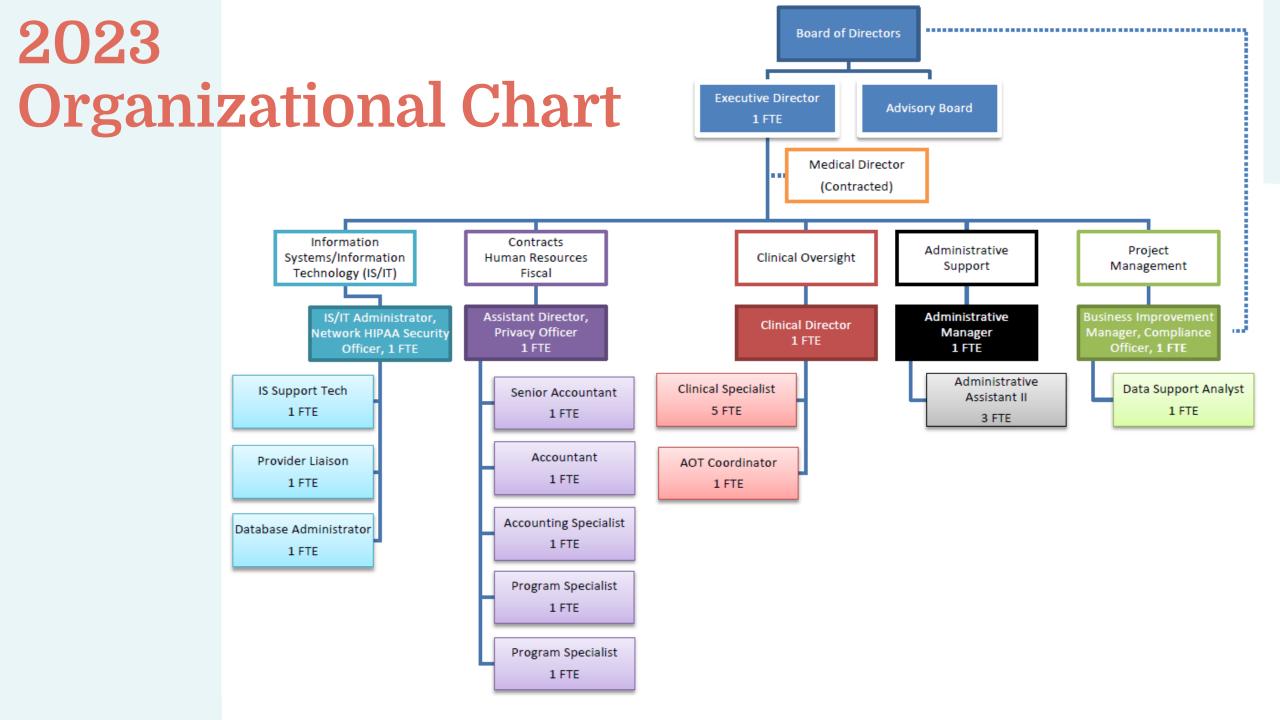

Serving Island, San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish and Whatcom Counties

1. NORTH SOUND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT

- In June, 2022, the North Sound BH-ASO Board of Directors approved a contract with the Cumming Management Group [in partnership with Percival Health] to update the original 2017 Behavioral Health Needs Assessment.
- The original needs assessment focused primarily on facility-based services. At the direction of the Board, the BH-ASO updated the scope of work to include outpatient services as well and the Percival Health became the lead for this new project.
- Percival Health collected utilization data, demographic data needs surveys collected from a variety of stakeholders.
- A draft of the Executive Summary is attached. [Attachment 1]
- We will be presenting the final report at the January Advisory Board and Board of Directors meetings.
- I will be proposing that an ad-hoc workgroup of County Coordinators and Advisory Board Members be formed to develop recommendations based on the report.

2. CLOSURE OF PIONEER CENTER NORTH

- Pioneer Human Services has notified us that it will be closing Pioneer Center North effective January 31, 2023. [see letter Attachment 2]
- They will cease admitting new clients as of December 1, 2022 and will notify current clients as of that date.
- Admitted clients will continue to receive treatment through January 31, and will discharge or transfer admitted clients on that date.
- They will continue to operate their other existing facilities.

3. EXTENSION OF COVID RELIEF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANT FUNDS EXPENDITURE PERIOD

- CMS has agreed to extend the period the state can use the COVID relief Substance Abuse Block Grant funds in addition to Mental Health Block Grant funds through September 2023.
- The state anticipates receiving the next round of Block Grant Relief Funds American Rescue Act funds – in July. The will allow the state and regions to continue to fund programs funded with the COVID relief funds.
- The North Sound BH-ASO however, will review the level of actual utilization of these funds and will recommend changes to better align with emerging needs and the capacity to sue these funds.

4. CRISIS SERVICES UPDATE

- The Weekly Crisis Capacity Indicator snapshot through November 26 is attached [Attachment 3].
- Also attached is the monthly Dashboard [Attachment 4].

5. UPDATE ON BALANCED BILLING ACT - HB 1688

- The state workgroup developing recommendations for the method by which commercial health carriers will reimburse providers of emergency behavioral health services has submitted its recommended plan that will be transmitted to the legislature.
- Under this proposal, the ASOs would collect the encounter data from providers of mobile crisis outreach services and report it to the commercial carriers. ASOs would continue to reimburse the providers at the normal rate and collect the resulting reimbursements from the commercial carriers.
- The proposed plan recommends that the new process would be implemented by January 2024. In the meantime, however, commercial carriers must accept and process "fee for service" claims as out of network services if providers so choose to bill them.
- Commercial carriers must also reimburse services provided in crisis stabilization facilities, but the plan calls for facilities to bill commercial carriers directly for these services.

6. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES COORDINATING COUNCIL -DISCUSSION ON NETWORK ADEQUACY

- The Behavioral Health Services Coordinating Council [BHSCC] workgroup on "network adequacy" continues to meet and refine its recommendations regarding strengthening the requirements for MCOs to ensure "network adequacy" and improve access to care.
- The plan is to improved standards, measurements, and accountability to be included in the next round of Integrated Managed Care contracts for January, 2025.
- In support of this effort, HCA staff is working on a grid detailing the various state efforts underway to better measure and monitor access to care, including the work on several legislative provisos such as the "rural behavioral health timely access study".
- The next meeting of the workgroup is on December 12.

7. UPDATE ON WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIES

- We have requested an update summary from HCA on the status of state led workforce development strategies, including the status of efforts authorized by last year's legislature.
- The funding for additional strategies may be included in the Governor's 2023 budget request which may be out next week.

8. MOUNT VERNON POLICE CO-RESPONDER PROJECT

- We received a progress report form the Mount Vernon police on the status of the coresponder project that we are funding with a combination of Proviso and Block Grant funds. This project is formally titled as the Mount Vernon "Integrated Outreach Services."
- Two of the four positions have been hired and on-boarding begun.
- Attached is a report on some of their early accomplishments. [Attachment 5]

9. NEW NORTH SOUND BH-ASO FISCAL APPOINTMENT

• We have filled the newly created positions of Accountant. Kimberly Nakatani will be joining us on December 1. She has extensive experience with fiscal operations.

10. END OF STATE COVID EMERGENCY ORDER

- The Governor's COVID Emergency Declaration ended October 31. Our Attorney has researched our options for continuing to use a "hybrid" model for Board of Director meetings under the Open Public Meetings Act.
- The OPMA requires that meetings be open to the public and available for public comment. Meetings that include a link for virtual participation can meet this requirement, however, the North Sound BH-ASO LLC's own by-laws only allow for voting in person.
- The Governance and Operations Committee has recommended that these by-laws be changed to also allow for voting on the virtual platform as well. The North Sound BH-ASO will be drafting the proposed language for the change.

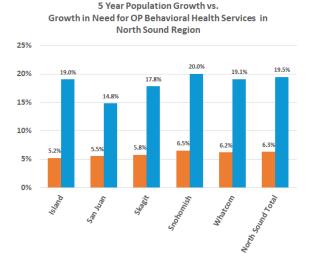

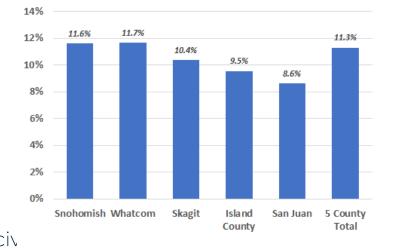
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Recent Trends and Projected Growth: Summary



⁵ year Projected IP Census Growth by County (Total Behavioral)

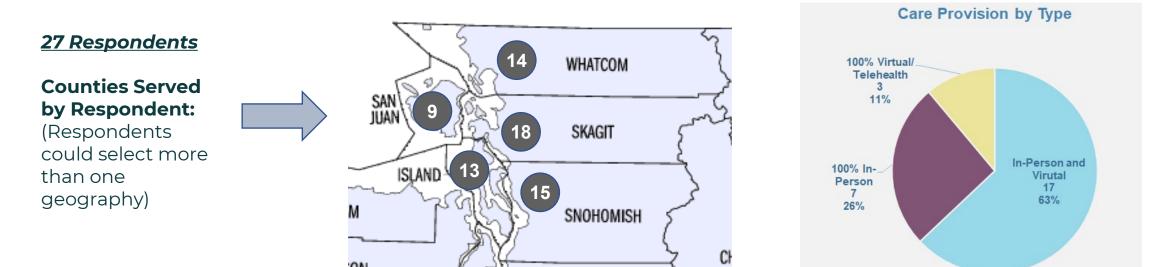


- A complete picture of recent trends in volume for crisis mental health services is difficult to paint given the lack of volume data made available by the Medicaid MCOs.
 Available data for the last couple years from NSBH-ASO suggests overall increases in crisis services volumes although the data is somewhat volatile.
- Survey Respondents indicate that recent volumes have shown increases and respondents are considering this "the new normal"
- Overall growth and aging of the population suggests that the need for both inpatient and outpatient behavioral health services will increase at a higher rate than the population itself:
 - Growth in outpatient behavioral health modalities is projected to increase 15%+ across services over the next 5 years.
 - Growth in inpatient behavioral health modalities is projected to increase ~10% over the next 5 years.

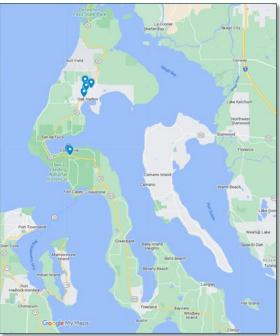

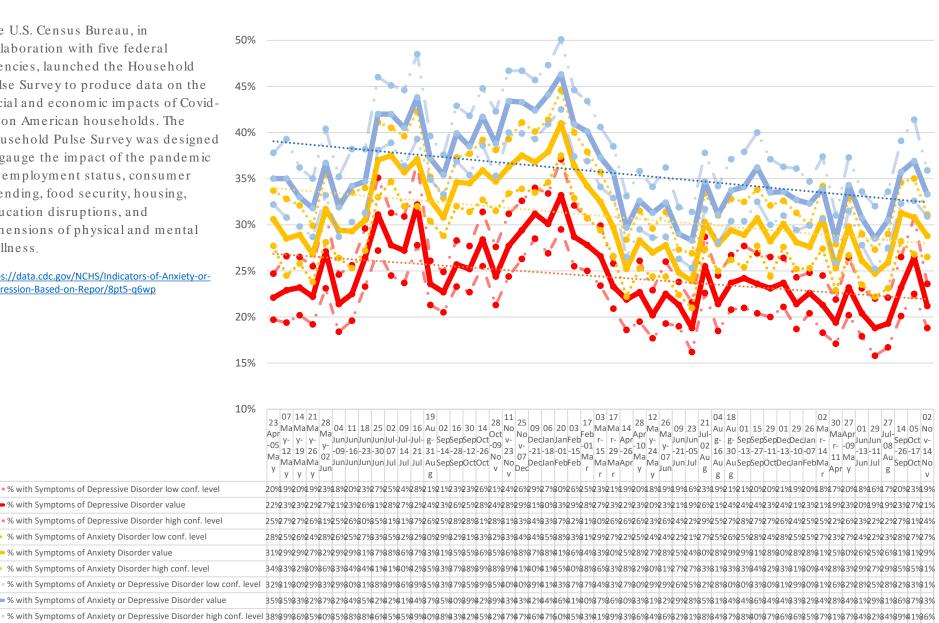

OUTREACH SERVICES

2022 Accomplishment Highlights

Client Effect

Changed or improved a quality-of-life goal for the individual.

Client I.L.

I.L. has been in enrolled in PACT services for many years until this year when he was disenrolled from their program while he was incarcerated. Between 2018 and 2022, I.L. has had 53 arrestable contacts, 72 warrants, been formally trespassed from Mount Vernon businesses 64 times, and has been in jail at least 31 times. This year alone, he has been contacted by the police for welfare checks/vagrancy issues at least 70 times. He has been trespassed from every hotel in Skagit Valley and has been evicted some several apartments. As he continued to deteriorate while living on the streets, MVPD and the Outreach Coordinator (OC) received many calls to help him. In August 2022, his safety and health were of great concern, MVPD began to plan how to obtain an involuntary detainment for him. Because he is known throughout the crisis mental health system and the local emergency department, every time he is seen, he's evaluated for how close to his "baseline" he is. Most of the time, he is released quickly either by the ED staff or the DCRs. In August of this year, we asked the County Health Department to help us develop a plan for his care. North Sound ASO, his managed care organization and MVPD joined forces. We developed a timeline for I.L. to be hospitalized with a plan for staying in a 90day bed in another hospital and, eventually, discharging to a different PACT program. This effort took the involvement of law enforcement, the civil commitment court, the County prosecutor, SVH psychiatrist and staff, his MCO, and North Sound E&T. He is currently in a 90day placement through the end of November. This is the longest time that he has received consistent care.

<u>Client E.T.</u>

E.T. is a Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) client. The only service provider in this area disenrolled him from services last year. Subsequently, DDA found one caregiver to assist E.T. At the time, E.T. was refusing to take his medications. This led to E.T. becoming combative and uncooperative. The caregiver quit; DDA had not found anyone to replace him. E.T. is known to the people without homes in our downtown area and a homeless couple moved into his apartment. At first, because E.T. was very lonely, he allowed this. Eventually the couple forbade E.T. from returned to his own home; he became himself to be homeless. Many 911 calls were generated about him. Because he didn't have

access to his home or medications, his negative behaviors increased. He was banned from many places in Mount Vernon, including Skagit Transit and incurred some legal problems too He has now agreed to move to any other part of Washington State to be able to have services and a new home. OC staff visited him every weekday to offer support, take him grocery shopping, help him reestablish his volunteer position at the Senior Center and ask the numerous other homeless people to leave his apartment when they have stayed overnight, and E.T. requests their eviction. We had to involve a MVPD Lieutenant in the coordination with Developmental Disabilities Administration (DD) and the Omsbud for DDA to obtain the cooperation of DDA leadership to find E.T. a more appropriate living situation. These efforts occurred between January 3, 2022, and June 22, 2022.

Client R.W.

R.W. is an individual that we classify as having a history of being one of the higher utilizers of 911 services in Skagit County. He has been banned from every hotel except one in the Skagit Valley, the First Steps Shelter and was a high utilizer of inappropriate ER services in both UGH and SVH. He became homeless when his family (mother, father and sister) all moved into a skilled nursing facility. R.W. was then banned from their home. He was invited into the Bridges Program at the Best Western Plus but was soon asked to leave due to some behaviors and high medical care needs. OC staff was able to work him into another motel sheltering program a few months ago and OC staff was providing the case management coordinating with Development Disabilities Administration, NW Regional Council, Skagit Regional Clinics, Take Aim, Development Disabilities Administration and Ombuds for DDA. He had contact with the OC staff 4 times per week. These efforts occurred between May 21, 2022, and October 21, 2022, when he moved to an adult family home in Snohomish County for a more permanent solution.

Providing Law Enforcement Based Outreach Services

Provide an alternative response to service calls historically handled by police.

Bridges Hotel Program began in February 2022. We have invited 17 people from Mount Vernon into the program over the course of its existence. One person passed away and seven of the individuals were asked to leave to be replace by others. We now have 14 people in 10 rooms. Throughout this time, OC staff have visited the hotel at least 3x/week. 2 people have completed all three Housing Authority's applications, several were connected to physical and behavioral health providers. Five have demonstrated ongoing, consistent reticence to connect to our Outreach Program or any other services. One is a graduate of Pioneer Center North, two are active in Drug Court. Erin receives at least 10 inquiries/week since March about this program.

- 4 people connected to SUDs services
- 3 people connected to mental health services
- 1 family of four returned to their home in Montana.
- 4 people located and connected to their 90 stay at First Steps.

- 15 law enforcement drop offs to First Steps.
- 1 person connected to Safe Parking
- 25 Housing Assessments completed
- 46 identification cards and/or drivers licenses obtained.

Systemic Effect - Behavioral health care for individuals coming through LE system

Improved ability to access behavioral health care/address systemic issues that create barriers.

Outreach Coordinator has been participating in various larger scale improvement projects, including the Skagit County's NorthStar Project, the Community Action's Recovery Navigation policy stakeholder group, and the Outreach Provider meetings, participating in the creation of a 2 day Recovery Services workshop, and collaborating with Seattle Times mental health project journalists to highlight some of the challenges this area faces.
