Summary:

Department of Commerce-Community Behavioral Health Rental Assistance

The funding for rental assistance is provided by the Department of Commerce. All five counties have received CBRA funds for individuals discharging from inpatient/residential/corrections facilities. The rental assistance is intended to stabilize the individual in permanent supportive housing; however, short term housing can be accessed with these funds until a long-term housing solution is found. Three providers requested additional funds for case management funded through our federal block grant. The CBRA and FBG funding is renewable and is provided in sixmonth allocations. The providers and funding for each county are listed below.

- Island County-Pioneer Human Services \$140,182
- San Juan County-Compass Health \$68,227
- Skagit County-Lifeline Connections (HARPS provider) \$88,523
- Snohomish County-Compass Health \$674,685 and Bridgeways \$122,187
- Whatcom County-Lifeline Connections (HARPS provider) \$188,249 and Lake Whatcom Center \$209,724

Motion #22-40

- North Sound BH-ASO-PHS-CBRA-22-23 to provide the CBRA rental assistance and case management services in Island County in the amount of \$140,182.00. The contract term is March 1, 2022, through February 28, 2023, with an automatic one-year renewal on March 1, 2023, based on continued compliance with the terms of the contract.

Summary:

Recovery Navigator Program (RNP)

Recovery Navigator Program is a legislative proviso delineated in the Blake Bill (ESB 5476), the funding is to establish a RNP in all five counties. The RNP is an outreach and engagement service to individuals with substance use disorders, co-occurring disorders who are risk of arrest and/or have frequent contact with law enforcement. Services include, but are not limited to, facilitation and coordination of community resources, coordination and communication with law enforcement, prosecutors, program staff and other partners. Intensive case management and care coordination are the cornerstones of the services.

Snohomish County's contract has been approved previously with the full annual funding.

Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Coordinator

Health Care Authority has funded a Full Time Equivalent (FTE) to coordinate the AOT program in the North Sound region. Assisted Outpatient Treatment is an order for Less Restrictive Alternative Treatment, this position will coordinate with local courts, behavioral health providers and Health Care Authority. The funding available for this position is \$140,000 annually.

Accountant

• During our succession planning process, we decided it would be prudent to add an accounting position to the 2023 ASO budget. With increases in funding, the complexity of

the funding and frequent reporting it is a high priority for the organization. We anticipate recruitment will begin in early 2023.

Child/Youth Mobile Crisis Team

• We have concluded the Child/Youth Mobile Crisis Team Request for Qualifications. The evaluation team met on August 4th and is recommending the Compass Health as the successful bidder for serving Skagit, Snohomish, and Whatcom counties.

Call to Order and Introductions - Chair

Chair Browning called the meeting to order and initiated introductions of the attendees who participated in person as well as those who participated via Zoom

The Chair noted that he had been out for a while and is glad to be back.

He also added that Skagit County is struggling with housing and noted we need to be thoughtful regarding new businesses opening in Skagit.

He also mentioned Skagit County is hoping to host an event on substance use disorder (SUD) fentanyl use. Discussion followed. Joe Valentine added that the ASO could assist. He said he can assign ASO staff to work with appropriate regional SUD providers who work with the folks who have the needed knowledge and data.

Reports from Members

- **San Juan:** 16% growth in county population. There are housing tension issues due to those leaving the island
- **Snohomish:** Managed Care Organizations (MCOs)-conversations are taking place regarding SUD issues; two Designated Crisis Responders (DCRs) were hired; Gov. Inslee toured the Behavioral Health Treatment Center; Sheriff's Department is now a more specialized unit as of June 16th
- **Skagit:** Co-responder model is working with the IMPACT in-house team; the needs assessment housing and behavioral health project is underway (North Star Project) there is limited capacity; Martha's place is still under construction and will be open early next year
- **Island:** No board member in attendance today
- **Whatcom:** There are upticks in behavioral health issues in the county; struggles with hospital discharges and workforce issues with the response systems division

Bellingham School District

The legislature provided funding for Whatcom County Schools to establish a Trauma Informed Counseling program in schools eligible for high-poverty allocations from the learning assistance program. The Bellingham School District #501 will serve the Bellingham area and Compass Health will serve county-based schools.

The funding for this project is \$300,000 annually, because we have a reserve of funding due to the difficulty in finding providers, we are asking for approval at the June meeting. The total funding for fiscal year 2022 and 2023 is \$600,000. The funding was distributed based on proposals presented to Whatcom County Human Services by Bellingham School District and Compass Health. This funding is not renewable, the county is exploring ongoing funding post June 30, 2023.



North Sound Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization August 11th, 2022 Board of Directors Financial Notes

HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The Budget to Actuals Looks pretty good. Our state funds are still showing a large positive variance even though we haven't received July's payment. Inpatient Treatment is still over budget, Mental Health crisis stabilization is currently showing a large variance, and Withdrawal Management is continuing to increase. HARPS and DOC housing is showing a large variance, I believe this is due to underestimating the expense and revenue when I built the budget, it may require a budget amendment later in the year, since this is an expense reimbursement program there won't be any financial impact. Most of the large positive expense variances are due to programs not running yet. Other SUD services has a large positive variance due mainly to the Recovery Navigator programs getting a late start.
- 2. The Revenue and Expense statement is still showing a large income which is mainly due to the payment of the November amendment amounts in January and would be higher if we had received July's payment. I finished the 3/31/22 R&E report for the State, that analysis shows that most of our State fund balance is tied to Proviso dollars, our available fund balance actually decreased slightly due to covering the MCO shortfall.
- 3. The one thing to note is the Medicaid fund balance, it has all been drawn down and the negative fund balance will need to be covered with State General Fund dollars, which we have enough of to cover. The good news is that we have had meetings with all five MCOs and they have all agreed to increase their PMPM payments.
- 4. We have included a January to December projection of our revenues and expenditures to try and forecast possible areas of concern. There are some large projected variances including Inpatient, ITA Judicial, and Harps and DOC. Withdrawal Management and Crisis Stabilization are continuing to run higher than budgeted. The bottom line shows us as still running \$992,271 under budget for the year.

NOTES

- 1. We are presenting the financial statements for July 2022 for the Behavioral Health Administrative Services Organization (ASO).
- 2. These monthly statements are prepared for the Board's use only. They provide a snapshot of expenses and revenue for a single calendar month compared with a hypothetical "year to date" projection. However, neither revenues nor expenditures occur on an equal 1/12 amount each month.

- 3. The North Sound BH-ASO adopts "calendar year" budgets, but the allocations from the state are done on a state fiscal year basis [with adjustments every 6 months]. The exceptions are Federal Block Grant Funds which are allocated for the entire fiscal year.
- 4. Revenues and expenses are managed independently within each of the major fund categories: Medicaid, State General Fund, Mental Health Block Grant, Substance Abuse Block Grant, and SAMHSA [a direct grant we receive from the federal government for our rural Medication Assistance Treatment program].
- 5. Within 'State General Funds', allocations are further subdivided between general state funds, and the multiple "Proviso" funds allocated for specific services.
- 6. We have added two new lines at the bottom of the "Revenue and Expense" tab which shows the beginning and ending fund balance within each fund category for the state fiscal year. I also added some additional lines at the bottom to show the Net Income from Operations before the transfer of funds to the BHO.
- 7. The Budget to Actuals statement includes notes on areas where there is a variance between the hypothetical year to date budget and actual revenues and expenditures. I also added additional lines at the bottom to show the transfer of funds separate from the normal operations.

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North Sound BH ASO Executive Director's Report

August 11, 2022

1. ACTIVATION OF STATE-WIDE 988 LINE

- The state-wide "988" line became officially active as of July 16.
- Attached is a fact sheet distributed by HCA. More extensive public information will be provided in late 2022 or early 2023 when the three "988" hubs in Washington State will have ramped up their capacity to handle the increased call volume [Attachment 1]

2. ASO/County Behavioral Health Legislative Priorities for 2023

- Attached is a summary of key statewide ASO legislative priorities. These have also been reviewed by the Association of County Human Services. [Attachment 2]
- The proposed priorities include:
 - 1) Development of more robust network adequacy standards and monitoring
 - 2) Full and separate funding for ITA Court Costs
 - 3) Build what already works in the '988' crisis system redesign and maintain county/ASO involvement
 - 4) Streamline legislative proviso funding allow for more flexibility and coordination to meet local needs

3. CRISIS SERVICES UPDATE

- Weekly Crisis Capacity Indicator snapshot and Dashboard [Attachments 3 and 4].
- There continued to be a steady increase in crisis services calls and mobile crisis team dispatches through the end of June. The numbers reported for the first few weeks of July had declined and then picked up again in the latest reporting week. This may be temporary trend or a lag in the data being reported to us.

4. TRANSITION OF THE OMBUDS SERVICES CONTRACT

- Effective October 1, 2022, the existing regionally organized behavioral health ombuds offices will be replaced by a State Office of Behavioral Health Advocacy as a result of Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill 1086.
- In the North Sound region, the ASO had contracted with Community Action of Skagit County [CASC] to provide these services. However, CASC notified us they will stop providing these services as of August 1.
- Since the ASO is contractually required to ensure Ombuds services are provided until October 1, we have arranged for internal ASO staff to handle any requests for Ombuds services in the interim.
- The state has awarded the new state-wide contract to "Peer Washington". They will be making a presentation at our September Advisory Board meeting.

• They have just hired the new Ombuds for the North Sound region – these positions will be called "Behavioral Health Care Navigators". She was also one of the existing staff with the Ombuds program at Community Action.

5. SUCCESSION PLANNING

- At the request of the Board of Directors, the ASO Leadership Team has developed a Succession plan that addresses key positions within the organization.
- For each position, the succession plan identifies the key skills needed and opportunities to develop the skills of some of the existing staff to perform these functions.
- The Succession planning process also included an "Environmental Scan" to identify the key challenges and opportunities in the future we must be ready to address.
- At its July 26 retreat, the Advisory Board also engaged in a similar environmental scan.

6. FACILITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

- Cummings LLC has begun the work to update the 2016 Behavioral Health Needs Assessment.
- The First step is to survey key stakeholder groups on were they see the gaps and need for both inpatient and outpatient services. Counties and Advisory Board members will be included in the survey.

7. UPDATE ON RFP FOR CHLDREN AND YOUTH MOBILE CRISIS TEAMS

• Assistant Director Margaret Rojas will provide a verbal update.

8. UPDATE ON RECOVERY NAVIGATOR PROGRAM [RNP]

• The 5 contracted RNP providers are now in the process of interviewing and hiring eligible candidates.

• The Advisory Board approved the plan for the 2022-2023 Federal Block Grant plan. Attached is a summary of the changes from 2021-2022. [Attachment 6 and 7]

10. TEAMonitor Review

- HCA conducted is its annual "TEAMonitor" review meeting of the North Sound BH-ASO on August 9.
- Of the 91 items reviewed, only 8 items were marked as having incomplete information. In most cases we did provide the information, but it was not in a form the reviewer could readily recognize.
- The Reviewers complemented the North Sound on having a "strong program" and considered the findings as "not significant."

988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline

988 Fast Facts

- 988 will be confidential, free, and available 24/7/365, connecting those experiencing a mental health, substance use, or suicidal crisis with trained crisis counselors.
- Access to the NSPL is available through every land line, cell phone, and voice-over internet device in the U.S.
- 988 services will be available in Spanish, along with interpretation services in over 250 languages.
- The 988 dialing code will be available for call, text, and chat by July 16, 2022. Until then, those in crisis should continue to use 1-800-273-TALK (8255), which will function even after July 16.

The nationwide implementation of the 988 three-digit call, text, and chat line is just the first important step in re-imagining crisis support in the U.S.

NSPL Crisis Centers

There are three NSPL crisis centers in Washington: Volunteers of America of Western Washington, Frontier Behavioral Health, and Crisis Connections.



HB 1477

HB 1477 provided funding to Washington's three NSPL crisis centers, including funding to begin hiring staff in anticipation of increased call volume.

988, WASHINGTON'S CRISIS RESPONSE

Building understanding, hope, and a path forward for those in need, where and when they need it.

Background and Implementation

- In 2020, the <u>Federal Communications</u>
 <u>Commission</u> (FCC) adopted the National
 Suicide Hotline Designation Act. The act made
 988 the new, nationwide, easy-to-remember
 3-digit dialing, texting, and chat number for
 anyone experiencing a suicidal or mental
 health-related crisis.
- 988 is not replacing existing crisis centers in Washington, but is the newest addition to the state's network of crisis center providers.
- To increase access to services for people in crisis, including people with disabilities and those who prefer text, the FCC adopted a Second Report and Order on November 18, 2021, to allow texting to 988.
- Veterans and service members may reach the Veterans Crisis Line by pressing 1 after dialing 1-800-273-TALK (8255). Spanish speakers may reach the Spanish Language Line by pressing 2.
- Vibrant Emotional Health, the National Administrator of 988, has done extensive planning to provide states with anticipated call, chat, and text volume estimates for when 988 goes live in July.
- HB 1477 dedicates crucial funding, via a tax on Washington's phone and Voice over Internet Protocol lines, to support the state's NSPL crisis centers' recruitment and hiring of additional staff to answer the anticipated increase of calls after July 16, 2022.

Highlights

- On July 16, 2022, phone calls to 988 will redirect to the NSPL crisis centers.
- The current NSPL number, 1-800-273-TALK (8255), will remain active after 988 goes live.
- Washington has three NSPL crisis centers:
 Volunteers of America of Western Washington,
 Frontier Behavioral Health, and Crisis Connections.
- Over the next few years, the <u>Crisis Response</u> <u>Improvement Strategy (CRIS) Committee</u> will develop recommendations to the Governor and Legislature to support additional components of HB 1477.



'One call for all': 988 mental health hotline quadruples Everett staff

Calls to the new Everett center have jumped 47% since the three-digit number rolled out. Gov. Inslee toured the facility Thursday.

EVERETT — A new three-digit number is making it easier for Washingtonians to receive mental health support in a crisis, including through an Everett call center.

The national 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline went live July 16, simplifying the previous 1–800–273–TALK contact for 24/7 crisis support. Now people can call, text or chat 988 to get connected with a trained crisis worker who provides free, confidential emotional support services any time of day.

Volunteers of America Western Washington's Behavioral Health Crisis Call Center in Everett acts as one of three 988 call centers in Washington. It fields calls from 32 of 39 counties in the state.

Gov. Jay Inslee and federal officials toured the Everett call center Thursday, touting it as one example of how Washington is "leading the nation" in mental health care.

"988 is great because it's a one call for all," Inslee said at a press conference outside the call center. "This means that no one is alone in the state of Washington. ... Everyone has a lifeline when they need it."

Ingrid Ulrey, a regional director for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, said she attended the tour to "affirm from the perspective of Secretary Xavier Becerra" that Washington is a leader in mental health care. She said it is "phenomenal" that a state passes laws to fund improved behavioral health crisis response.

Washington added 988 to its existing "network" of crisis call centers, as part of a bill lawmakers passed in April, the first change in a multi-year plan.

Other updates include "developing technology that allows a rapid hand-off of services," Inslee said. That means making it easier for crisis counselors to connect callers with next-day doctor's appointments, as well as strengthening mobile crisis teams that can respond in-person to people who need help beyond what the call line can provide.

"We do have those teams now, but they don't always have the funding or staff or resources to respond in a quick time," said Jacy Wade, a follow-up peer support specialist with Volunteers of America. Changes prompted by the bill will be funded by the new 988 tax on cellular and internet phone service. The tax is 24 cents per line per month through the end of this year, then increases to 40 cents per line per month beginning in January 2023.

The state also plans to bolster culturally competent services for Indigenous people in the state. That work is already underway with Volunteers of America, which launched the "Native and Strong Lifeline" staffed by Indigenous crisis counselors.

"We know there's still a lot of work to be done to create better outcomes for our community when they experience a crisis," said Levi Van Dyke, senior director of the Everett center.

In preparation for the new call center, Van Dyke quadrupled his staff, and there are now 83 crisis counselors answering 988 calls.

As expected, calls to the Everett center have jumped 47% to about 150 per day, in the 12 days since the new number rolled out, said Maca Ferguson, spokesperson for Volunteers of America Western Washington. Compared to the same time last year, calls are up 66%.

Many callers share that they're using the support system now because 988 is easier to remember and dial than the old number.

"Anecdotally, I've listened to calls where people said, 'I wouldn't have called if there wasn't this number,'" said Courtney Colwell, a 988 program manager with Volunteers of America.

The staffing boost decreased wait times for people who seek help. Most people wait about seven seconds before getting connected to a worker, said Andrea Rhinus, 988 chat and text coordinator.

Once connected, the crisis counselor listens to the person's story to understand what the problem is and how best to help. The workers talk through a situation, offer ideas for a coping mechanism and provide referrals for future mental health care. The counselors guide people through their mental health crises. They don't tell callers exactly what to do.

"We are the navigators, but they control the boat," said Michael Lane, a crisis shift manager.

Lane said he especially enjoys learning about each caller's personality. In suggesting coping mechanisms, he hears about hobbies and interests. He empowers them to embrace what makes them special.

Employees emphasized that 988 is not linked to law enforcement. Fewer than 2% of calls to the number involve local emergency services. For those that do, more than half happen with the caller's consent.

"This lifeline is a way for someone in crisis to get counselors, to get immediate help right there," said Umair Shah, the state secretary of health. "It's not about law enforcement. ... It's trained mental health counselors that will be answering the phone ... every single time."

Just knowing they helped someone through a difficult situation keeps the staff motivated.

"For me," Jacy Wade said, "I feel like a lot of people are grateful at the end of the call ... I know I was there for them in that moment."

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BH-ASO 2023 DRAFT LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

1. Network Adequacy Standards

By December 2023, update network adequacy standards for all Medicaid-covered behavioral health services that include:

- How stakeholders including community behavioral health providers and counties will be included in the process to update standards;
- An explanation of how updated network adequacy standards will account for both population and prevalence factors as well as time and distance standards for rural and urban communities; and,
- A plan for robust network adequacy monitoring including monitoring timeliness requirements.

2. Fully Fund Court Costs for Involuntary Treatment Act [ITA] Hearings

- Fully fund ITA court costs through a separate and distinct legislative appropriation to
 ensure ASO funds intended for treatment are no longer diverted to pay for rising court
 costs.
- Direct HCA to undertake annual rate setting and budget forecasting for ITA court costs.

3. Build on what works in Crisis System Redesign

- In developing the new enhanced "988"/ HB 1477 Crisis System build on the elements of the current crisis system that already work.
- Maintain a continued role for county and ASO management and performance monitoring of local crisis systems.

4. Streamline Funding Opportunities


- Streamline legislative funding for behavioral health services to better support successful program development and sustainability.
- Allow more flexibility with legislative "proviso" funding to meet unique community needs.
- When possible, integrate provisos with similar scopes and purposes to maximize the
 available funds and remove the barriers of narrow specifications that make it more
 challenging to use the available resources.








Washington State Indicators of Anxiety or Depression Based on Reported Frequency of Symptoms During Last 7 Days

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


Place of Service - Crisis Services, percent of total by week




Place of Service -Investigations, percent of total by week














